

Founded in 2004, Suncoast Voices for Children serves youth across Florida's Sixth Judicial Circuit by filling critical gaps in the child welfare system.

Created by Guardians ad Litem in response to children being left without essential support, SVC provides rapid, direct assistance when kids and families are in crisis.

Our focus is meeting urgent needs early, often before a child enters foster care. By helping stabilize families when possible and being there for children when foster care is necessary, we work to keep kids safe, supported, and given the chance to thrive.

We want to see every child in Pinellas and Pasco Counties enjoy a childhood free from fear and deprivation.




OUR IMPACT

At Suncoast Voices, we do everything possible to keep children from entering foster care by supporting placements with relatives, friends, or other trusted loved ones while their family situation stabilizes.

Often, that means helping caregivers obtain the beds, car seats, and other essentials required to make a safe and approved home.

When foster care cannot be avoided, we continue to protect and uplift children by providing safety items needed for licensing, lock boxes to keep them away from weapons or medications, and other critical supports. We also create opportunities for kids to experience a sense of normalcy through music lessons, summer camps, sports, and other childhood activities. Academic support, including professional tutoring, helps them stay on track despite school changes or instability at home.

There are many children in need and much work to do to ease their challenges, keep them engaged, and prevent them from becoming just another statistic. Your support makes this possible every week of the year, and the impact is felt year-round.



SUNCOAST STORY

Fifteen-year-old Jaleesa is currently living in a group home after experiencing family instability, substance-related challenges in her home, and a lack of consistent adult supervision. With no safe caregiver available at the time, she entered foster care after the friend she had been staying with could no longer provide housing. Her father lives out of state, her grandfather was unable to take her back into his home, and her mother is currently focusing on her mental health so she can one day reunify and provide a more stable future for her daughter.

As temperatures dropped, Jaleesa found herself without appropriate winter clothing. Suncoast Voices stepped in to provide warm clothes, helping her stay comfortable, confident, and prepared for school and daily life. This support did more than meet a basic need. It reminded Jaleesa that she is seen, cared for, and worthy of the same comfort and dignity as any other child.

PREVENT

Children must be removed from unsafe situations to protect their wellbeing, but foster care is not always the only or best next step. Suncoast Voices works to PREVENT unnecessary placements by partnering with Child Protective Investigators and Case Managers to help children stay safely with relatives they know and trust.

We provide immediate access to pack-n-plays, car seats, beds, cribs, bedding, and other essential safety items so caregivers can meet state requirements without delay. Too often, children are separated from family simply because these basics are unaffordable or unavailable in a crisis.

Because we are embedded in CPI offices, we can respond instantly, equip families quickly, and help children remain connected to the people who love them.

PROTECT

Since 2015, the Pinellas County Medical Examiner has reported dozens of preventable infant deaths caused by unsafe sleep environments. Infants are 40 times more likely to die when sleeping in an adult bed than in a crib, and three out of four sleep-related deaths among babies under four months old, involved bed-sharing.

In response, Suncoast Voices helps PROTECT kids by providing more than 1,000 cribs, beds, and pack-n-plays in each year, including bunk beds that help keep siblings together safely. We also work to protect children by supplying essential safety items such as car seats, bike helmets, door locks, gun locks, and secure cabinets for medications and cleaning supplies.

PROVIDE

More than almost anything else, children in foster care want to feel like normal kids. For them, "normal" means doing the same things their peers do. Taking music or dance lessons. Playing sports. Learning computer skills. Celebrating birthdays with a cake and someone who cares.

When children have so little, even small experiences can make a meaningful difference in their confidence, joy, and sense of belonging.

While the state covers basic needs like food and shelter, it does not fund opportunities such as hobbies, summer camps, clubs, or enrichment activities. Suncoast Voices helps fill that gap as we PROVIDE funding for everything from private tutoring and art classes to school uniforms and everyday moments that allow kids to simply be kids.

Dear Friends and Supporters--

As we reflect on the 2024–2025 year at Suncoast Voices for Children, we are filled with gratitude for what our community, partners, staff, volunteers, and supporters have made possible.

This year, we served more than 4,000 children and young adults across Pinellas and Pasco Counties, providing over \$565,000 in direct support to meet urgent needs, improve safety, and expand opportunities.

As part of our continued 20th Anniversary celebration, we strengthened core programs like the Children’s Needs Program, Style Voiced clothing closets, and financial empowerment initiatives through Opportunity Passport. We helped keep children safe by distributing more than 1,000 beds, cribs, and pack-n-plays, and helped 136 children remain in the custody of licensed relative caregivers so they could stay connected to family instead of entering foster care. We also launched our new Celebrating Milestones Graduation Package Program, ensuring high school seniors in care feel recognized, prepared, and supported as they take their next steps. In addition, 75 young adults received financial literacy education, helping them build confidence and independence.

Because of your generosity, we were able to respond quickly when children were in crisis, provide meaningful stability during times of transition, and create moments of normalcy that remind young people they are seen, valued, and worthy of opportunity.

None of this work happens without the dedication of our volunteers, community partners, board members, staff, and advocates. And to our donors, your trust and generosity fuel every success. Together, we are preventing unnecessary foster care placements, supporting children in care, and equipping young adults to build brighter futures.

We are humbled by the impact of this past year and energized for the work ahead. There is still much to do, and with you by our side, we will continue to be the voice these children deserve.



SUNCOAST STORIES



Gianna, 15, lost her mother when she was just a baby and has spent most of her life moving in and out of group homes because her father was absent and couldn't be found. Finally, after many years, she was able to live with her grandmother who was her last chance for a stable placement, as there were no other family members available to take her in.

However, there was a pressing need because her grandmother couldn't afford the essentials needed to create a nurturing home for her granddaughter. It was our goal to change this and ensure that she had a safe and secure environment where she can thrive. Suncoast Voices helped provide a bed and other supplies to provide Gianna with a sense of normalcy.

When child protective services investigated concerns at home, it became clear that Marcus was also struggling in other areas of his life. He was being bullied at school and felt isolated, with few opportunities to make friends. To give him a safe and positive space to connect with peers, Suncoast Voices provided a membership for Marcus and his mom to the YMCA. This gave Marcus the chance to build confidence, form friendships, and enjoy activities in a supportive environment, helping him feel less alone and more connected.

GIFTS IN ACTION

With your support, Suncoast Voices has helped keep more children safely out of foster care and ensured that children in care receive the same love, stability, and opportunities you would want for your own children and grandchildren.



SAFE WITH FAMILY **2,455 youth, \$293,876**

Voices provides beds, pack-n-plays, safety equipment and more to help safe, loving grandparents, aunts and uncles to take custody of the children in their family to keep them out of foster care.



SOCIAL NORMALCY **281 youth, \$27,294**

Voices provides children with access to activities, camps, music lessons, basketball shoes, prom dresses, field trips and more that are not funded by the State of Florida.



LEVEL I LICENSING **136 youth, \$8,611**

Voices provides homes with safety items to help keep kids safe with a relative caregiver and help prevent them from entering the foster care system.



SAFE TRAVEL **224 youth, \$25,307**

Voices provides young people with bikes, bike helmets, strollers, car seats and more.



CLOTHING AND FOOD **1,287 youth, \$81,746**

Voices provides emergency food and clothing access when food pantries and other services aren't accessible.



HEALTH AND LEGAL **9 youth, \$328**

Voices helps children receive assistance that isn't covered by insurance like dental anesthesia as well as help with legal fees for youth who have completed community service and who are working toward education and career goals.



EDUCATION **52 youth, \$11,728**

Voices provides children with uniforms, laptops, tablets, backpacks, school supplies and more.



OPPORTUNITY PASSPORT **212 youth, \$116,826**

PROGRAM UPDATES

CHILDREN'S NEEDS

Every month, children in Pinellas and Pasco Counties enter the child welfare system through no fault of their own, often removed from their homes due to abuse, neglect, or abandonment. While state funding covers basic care, it rarely addresses the full emotional, developmental, and practical needs that arise from trauma and instability.

Our Children's Needs Program steps in to fill those gaps by working to prevent unnecessary foster care placements, protect children when they are in crisis, and provide meaningful support that helps them heal and thrive. Through the generosity of our donors and partners, we respond quickly to urgent needs such as safe beds, cribs, car seats, clothing, and safety items. We also fund enrichment opportunities, tutoring, milestone celebrations, and other supports that restore a sense of normalcy and dignity.

By meeting both immediate and long-term needs, the Children's Needs Program ensures vulnerable children are not only safe, but seen, supported, and given the chance to build brighter futures.

CELEBRATING MILESTONES

Many children in foster care miss out on the celebrations and recognition their peers experience. To help change that, Suncoast Voices launched the Celebrating Milestones initiative in May 2025. Through this effort, we created special graduation packages for every high school senior in care filled with essentials and thoughtful gifts to make sure each graduate felt seen, valued, and supported as they took their next step toward adulthood.





STYLE VOICED

Many children are forced to leave home suddenly due to unsafe situations and do not have time to pack, often leaving with only the clothes they are wearing. The Style Voiced Clothing Program ensures these children have immediate access to clean, appropriate clothing, toiletries, and essential personal items when they enter foster care or are at risk of doing so.

Through four Style Voiced Closets located within Child Protective Investigation offices and Family Support Services offices in Pinellas and Pasco Counties, children can receive either a personalized shopping experience or a ready-to-go bag during moments of crisis.

This program is made possible by the generosity of individuals and community partners who host donation drives throughout the year, keeping the closets stocked with new and like-new items so children can feel cared for, dignified, and supported during an incredibly difficult time.

OPPORTUNITY PASSPORT®

Young people aging out of foster care often face financial barriers that can limit their path to independence. Opportunity Passport®, a program of the Jim Casey Youth Opportunities Initiative, equips youth transitioning from foster care with essential money management skills, access to mainstream banking, and a matched savings program to help them build assets and long-term stability.

Suncoast Voices participated in the CoachingUnited® Financial Coaching training to bring that component in-house, expanding our ability to provide personalized, consistent support to young adults as they work toward their financial goals. We are also proud to send Serena, one of our Opportunity Passport® graduates, to the Youth Leadership Institute (YLI), where she strengthened her leadership skills and served as a powerful advocate for youth with lived experience in foster care.

In continued partnership with United Way Suncoast, Ready for Life, and Camelot Community Care, Opportunity Passport® remains a critical pathway to financial confidence, economic opportunity, and a stronger future for the young people we serve.

SUNCOAST STORIES



Samuel entered care at a very young age due to his parents' struggles with substance abuse. Despite these challenges, he has worked hard on his own recovery, completing a voluntary substance abuse program.

Upon exiting, Suncoast Voices learned that Samuel's shoes were falling apart and were being held together by super glue. He also didn't have enough clothing.

Suncoast Voices stepped in to provide a gift card so he could purchase what he needed. Having new shoes and clothes helped Samuel feel more comfortable and confident as he took his next steps in both school and social settings.

Sahira and Ceraya came into placement because one of them ingested cocaine and the other was physically abused. They were fortunate to be able to be placed with their aunt but unfortunately, she did not have the financial means to provide for them yet because she just started a new job. With the children's mother refusing to give the caregiver the children's clothes, Voices was able to provide clothing and shoes for both children to have the essentials that they needed to feel a sense of normalcy.

Allie, 17, was placed in care in 2023 as she was residing with family and supporting herself when the home became disruptive, and she was removed. Her mother passed away in 2016 and the father was out of state and nowhere to be found. Finding out that her father passed away in April 2024, she remained in her foster care placement. Voices helped provide a bike and clothing so that she could have the items needed to obtain a job as the department felt that the child needed to have a job to feel successful in her path of self-sufficiency as she became an adult.

SUNCOAST STORY

Renley, age 9, came into care due to abuse by her mother's paramour. She and her twin sister are in the care of their adult sister. Kenley is encountering some struggles in school particularly in reading and math and is in need of tutoring to help her thrive in school and in her new placement. Suncoast Voices was able to help provide tutoring to help her regain a sense of consistency, stability and success.

WHY OUR WORK MATTERS

Since 2004, Suncoast Voices for Children has supported thousands of abused, abandoned, and neglected children by meeting urgent needs and funding opportunities that improve their safety, stability, and well-being. Child welfare workers regularly request help with essentials such as beds, tutoring, safety items, and meaningful life experiences. Our volunteer board meets year-round to review requests and ensure funds are used responsibly, with an average of 85 cents of every dollar spent directly on children.

The stakes are high. Former foster youth face significantly higher risks of academic failure or incompleteness, homelessness, unemployment, poor health, and involvement with the justice system if they do not receive targeted support.

Suncoast Voices works to change these outcomes by strengthening family connections whenever possible, supporting stable placements, and giving young people opportunities to discover their talents through sports, music, tutoring, and mentoring. We also help young adults transitioning out of foster care by providing housing support, education resources, and financial literacy through Opportunity Passport.

Our work matters because it interrupts cycles of trauma and creates pathways to hope, confidence, and long-term success. Most importantly, it shows children that they are valued, believed in, and never alone.


